This report has been prepared in accordance with the Environment (Wales) Act 2016 Part 1 – Section 6, the Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty.

The administrative area of Caerwys Town Council reaches the village of Afonwen, part of Babell, Pen Y Cefn and Caerwys Town itself. The population of the area is 1,007 (January 2023 Register of Electors).

The Caerwys Town Council precept for the financial year 2023 / 2024 is £41,250.00. This amount is precept on residential properties within the community and equates to a figure of £63.39p per household on a Band D property.

At the current time, Caerwys Town Council does not have direct responsibility for any green spaces but are actively supporting the local biodiversity through a number of initiatives – as detailed below

Updates:

December, 2022

In accordance with the Environmental (Wales) Act, 2016 – this Council provides the following update as required up to December, 2022.

The Caerwys Town Council have actively promoted biodiversity within the community:

- Continue to share information with residents
- Completed on-line surveys
- Continue to liaise with the Flintshire County Council Bio-diversity Officers
- Identified local areas to be included in the Flintshire Bio-diversity projects plan
- Continue to include bio-diversity comments to planning applications, when applicable

On Wednesday 5th October, 2022 – two Town Councillors (Gwen Jones & Judith Standring) attended a site meeting with Ellie Wainwright (Flintshire County Council Biodiversity Assistant). A number of potential sites to increase bio-diversity were identified.

On Wednesday 7th December, 2022, the below plan was received from Flintshire County Council, advising of areas identified following the above site meeting in October – whereby various species of trees will be planted.
