# POLICY STATEMENT & ACTION PLAN 2021 – 2026

This report has been prepared in accordance with the Environment (Wales) Act 2016 Part 1 – Section 6, the Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty.

The administrative area of Caerwys Town Council reaches the village of Afonwen, part of Babell, Pen Y Cefn and Caerwys Town itself. The population of the area is 1,007 (January 2023 Register of Electors).

The Caerwys Town Council precept for the financial year 2023 / 2024 is £41,250.00. This amount is precept on residential properties within the community and equates to a figure of £63.39p per household on a Band D property.

At the current time, Caerwys Town Council does not have direct responsibility for any green spaces but are actively supporting the local biodiversity through a number of initiatives – as detailed below

At the Council meeting held on Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> January 2022, under minute number 7(H). 15/22 an updated plan was formally approved and adopted. The plan will be reviewed in October each year, or earlier, if necessary and recorded in minute book.

#### December, 2022


In accordance with the Environmental (Wales) Act, 2016 – this Council provides the following update as required up to December, 2022.

On Wednesday 5<sup>th</sup> October, 2022 – two Town Councillors (Gwen Jones & Judith Standring) attended a site meeting with Ellie Wainwright (Flintshire County Council Biodiversity Assistant). A number of potential sites to increase bio-diversity were identified.

On Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> December, 2022, the below plan was received from Flintshire County Council, advising of areas identified following the above site meeting in October – whereby various species of trees will be planted.



#### **Updates:**

#### October, 2025

In accordance with the Environmental (Wales) Act, 2016 – this Council provides the following update as required towards the end of 2025

The Caerwys Town Council continues to actively promote biodiversity within the community:

- Continue to share information with residents
- Completed on-line surveys
- Continue to liaise with the Flintshire County Council Bio-diversity Officers
- Identified local areas to be included in the Flintshire Bio-diversity projects plan
- Continue to include bio-diversity comments to planning applications, when applicable

Caerwys' biodiversity is supported by its varied landscape, which includes limestone-based habitats, woodlands, and former industrial sites that have become wildlife havens.

#### Nature reserves and wild spaces:

- Coed Pwllgwyn:
- An ancient semi-natural woodland managed to maintain a diverse understory and allow for continued development into mature broadleaved high forest.

#### Habitat types:

- **Limestone-based habitats:** The area's limestone geology supports unique grasslands with species like cowslips and common spotted-orchid.
- **Former quarries:** Historically exploited quarries are now important habitats for wildlife, including newts, grass snakes, and insects.
- **Green infrastructure:** Undesignated habitats like streams, ponds, and old hedgerows are crucial green corridors for wildlife across the landscape.

#### Native breeds:

- The use of native breeds for grazing plays a role in maintaining natural habitats and increasing biodiversity.
- There is a local connection to the Rare Breeds Survival Trust, which works to protect rare and native livestock breeds that are important for maintaining genetic diversity.

During June 2025 the Flintshire Biodiversity Officer and her assistant met with Caerwys Town Councillor Janet Legget-Jones, the Town Clerk and a representative from the Caerwys Memorial Institute. As the Town Council do not have any suitable land to create a wildflower area the meeting was held to discuss a suitable site within the Memorial Institute grounds. The meeting was productive with the following agreed:

- Children's play area: Some planting and natural play features, a landscaped hump (for children to roll down), willow tunnel, log stepping-stones
- To re-establish a wildflower area in corner of play area: Maintain some mown grass under the trees to the eastern end to allow some shade for sitting, consider a shade tolerant seed mix with opportunity for some native bulb planting

 Opportunity for tree planting and interpretation to be followed up after main changes to play area are completed and site is seeded in September 2025
